Last year we had 10 Race Events. Our 2003 Champions Rich Bolt and Sheryl Wheeler pass their titles to 2004 Champions Ben Nephew and Kelli Lusk.

We had 7 different Men's winners, and 8 different Lady's winners. Kelli Lusk won 4 individual events and Jacque Schiffer won 2. For the men, Rich Bolt won 3, and Elijah Barrett, Jim Pawlicki and Leigh Schmitt 2 each. As the years pass, we seem to attract more and more fast shoers to our series. Thanks everyone!

VIEW FROM THE SIDELINES, USSSA NATIONALS

Bill Raitter (Oregon/La Sportiva) was kicked back in his chair sipping a Natural Light Beer and chatting about siphoning gas as he made his way from Tahoe to Michigan on a road trip that ultimately lead to meeting his wife Sarah. The CMS (Central Mass. Striders) gang had just returned from a 5m run up and down highway 267 to the pass between lake Tahoe and Truckee CA. The post-Nationals wind down had officially begun.

8 ½ hours earlier all had been lined up at the starting line of the Nike ACG USSSA National championships. Ninety of the countries finest snowshoe runners were prepared to take on the 10K cruise around Squaw Creek Ski area. The 6200' start and 7000' summit of the course would seem to favor the altitude trained athletes. The 800' initial climb during the first mile and the ensuing drop from 2-2.5 miles also would seem to favor strong climber/descenders. The CMS / Atlas / Redfeather / Dion / Powerbar / team ran part of the course on the previous afternoon and found the course to be challenging. The last 3m featured a few rolling hills and alternated between fast groomed sections and stretches, of various length, of untracked snow. The 60+ degree temperatures the day before and the 20-degree overnight temps left most of the course solidly packed.

During the previous days course preview I ran the entire course to get a feel for where I could best view the action. After running the course in 62 minutes I declared the course to be beautiful, tough, and (Sorry to RD Peter Fain) definitely short of 10k! Ben Nephew (CMS/Dion), the fastest American at 50k in 2003, noted that the steepest pitch of the course, which was ¾ of a mile into the race, was easier to run "using my hands as well". Rich Bolt (CMS/Atlas) felt that the course conditions in the initial climb would favor Paul Low (CMS/Redfeather). "I know I can't run as fast as Paul in mountain races" Rich confided. Paul, who was the USATF Mountain runner of the year in 2003, called it "a fair course" but wondered, "how much of a disadvantage the altitude is". Kelli Lusk (CMS/Readfeather), the 2003 National champion called it "Colorado style racing".

The start was set for 8:30 am, and the field could be seen completing various warm-up preparations. Many chose to run part of the course as a warm-up and the conditions were such that snowshoes weren't needed. I headed up the hill (without snowshoes) to take pictures and offer encouragement. I picked a spot just before the steepest section, where I could see the start and still make it down the hill to catch the runners on the other side of the valley. Rich, who has been tearing up the racing scene in New England, got off the line quickly to avoid any entanglements (last years start had some people trip at the start). He then eased up to remain "comfortable on the climb". Ben who is known for his lightning fast starts, was amazed at Rich's start proclaiming "that is the first time you beat me off of the line this year". Paul felt "If I can't win I'll be first to the top". In contrast, Kevin Tilton (CMS/in borrowed Atlas) went easy off the line and moved up into the top 10 on the climb. On the previous days preview Kevin had lead to the top, occasionally pushing the pace despite suffering from a chest cold. Jim Pawlicki (CMS/Tubbs) declared the climb "awesome" and continued "it was great to see Paul

leading the field". Anita Ortiz (Colorado) was the women's leader at the top but was closely followed by Nikki Kimball (CMS/Atlas). The top women were closely clustered, with last years champion Kelli Lusk (CMS/Redfeather) in third and Kara Haas (GLRR) in 10th.

As the field heading into the traverse section I made my way back down the mountain, taking pictures and yelling encouragement as I went. I must have yelled "one more steep pitch and your at the top" about fifty times. I made my way over to the one road crossing on the course. This was at the transition point between the mountain and the meadow sections of the race. The couple of hours of sunlight on the meadow had softened up the untracked sections and it looked like the second half of the race would be exciting.

Paul continued to lead on the traverse with Greg Krause (Colorado/Atlas) only seconds behind. Paul noted, "I could hear him the whole time, but I had no idea who he was". Ben summed up how most of the group felt on the single-track traverse when he said "I was waiting to recover... it never happened" Rich said that "the single track was uneven from 'post holes' and was very tough work". Kevin and Ben worked together on this part and most of the top positions remained unchanged.

The extremely steep downhill saw Greg move into the lead briefly. Paul, who called the conditions and course "good for my abilities", re-passed him just before the road crossing. The descent had as many styles of running as there were runners. Kevin fell and lost his glasses and once he reclaimed them he proceeded to "slide as long as I could" and "wish I had worn gloves!" Ben, who is one of the strongest 'rough' descenders around, took an uncharacteristic spill early on. He then jumped off of the slick beaten down track and "hit the powder". Rich fell back and "lost a lot of ground on the downhill". Jim called the downhill "reckless" and Kelli proclaimed it to be "carnage". Dan seemed unfazed by the down, noting that he "ran slow on the climb and even slower on the descent". At the time Dan was right behind Anita who continued to lead with Nikki close behind. "Nikki slid down the hill faster than I ran" according to Dan.

The racers began a short 1.5m section in the meadow, which would bring them back past the start/finish line at 4m. The start/finish area was crowded (well, as crowded as snowshoe races get) with anxious spouses, friends, and the race sponsors. All were waiting for the first glimpse of the unfolding drama. Paul powered through in the lead with Greg scant seconds behind. I juggled my photo opportunities with a desperate search for the car keys to avoid getting towed (despite our "technically" being legally parked). Fortunately we didn't get towed, however Anita ended up not so lucky and came away with a \$450 towing fee. Back in the race, Ben had moved up to 12th despite "wanted to be done at 4m'. Kevin came through next and despite "hitting the wall at 4m" vowed to "maintain position in the last 2m". Rich was close behind feeling that he "didn't have it" and that he hoped to "not lose too much in the 2nd half". Dan was next through now in the top twenty having "reached deep down into the pride barrel" and "passed Anita and Nikki and a lot of other people in the

Meadow". Jim found it tough to pass through the start/ finish but "got some wind back on the rolling part." Nikki, who had recently been named Ultrarunner of the Year, came through with a 15-second lead over Anita. Kelli came through in fifth. "I wish someone would put me out of my misery" was her take on the second half. The rest of the top ten had 5 runners coming through in the next minute. Kara was looking strong in only her second snowshoe race (the first being the NE regional qualifier) coming through in 10th place.

The sun and rapidly rising temps were now turning the untracked sections into 'slow grinds'. Just before the last, and especially long, untracked part Greg moved back into the lead. Paul felt he "didn't have much left" on this part and got onto the final 1/4 mile groomed part of the course where he "hit the wall" and felt "totally dead". Despite that, he kept working hard and finished 2nd only 18 seconds out. The next 8 runners were fairly evenly spread out as they passed me and made their way through the last 1:30 or so of running to go. They all came through in the next 1.5 minutes. Bernie Boettcher (Colorado) was third and top master followed Charlie Wertheim (Colorado) and Max King (Oregon) rounding out the top five. Ben had slowly moved up, passing Rich at 5m and moving up as high as tenth despite the untracked portions being "dirt slow" and the loss of one of his steel crampons. Kevin was next in 12th place finishing strong in only his fourth snowshoe race. He did note that it would be "worth doing again" however "one detriment was that I hadn't spent enough time practicing on powder". Rich, the veteran of the group competing in his third consecutive Nationals came by in 13th. Dan was next in 15th taking fourth in the master's competition. He noted that he felt "comfortable in the second half, probably because I went so slow in the first half". Jim, who recently moved into first place in the WMAC Series, was next in 20th place. He summed up the experience saying "I didn't know what to expect, I was happy to beat some of the guys who beat me in the qualifier".

Nikki came by just as Anita moved into the final uphill part of the untracked section. She looked very strong in the last part but still was worried about how far Anita was behind her. Nikki has incredible range, racing from 10k on snowshoes to 100k in road races, which is backed up by her #1 ranking for 50 miles in 2003. She prepared for Nationals by running a few of the WMAC races where she and Kelli staged some epic battles. Each won a number of the races and both destroyed many course records over this season. Anita came through next scoring the runner-up position and staking claim to the top masters spot. Helen Cospolich (Colorado) was third, followed by Sarah Raitter (Oregon). Kelli took fifth on what was "just one of those days" and although disappointed, felt that it was "a good season so far". Kara came in 10th just 2 minutes behind; she really pushed the last section to hold on to the top 10 spot. When I saw her after the race she was, as always, smiling pleasantly and despite just finishing asked "are you warming down?" I had a short chat with WMAC's Laurel Shortell (MA) and Carol Kane (CT) after the race. The pair had raced the day before in the WMAC series race at Moody Springs. Laurel arrived well after midnight and "slept a couple of hours" prior to the race. She has a streak dating back three years of competing in all of the WMAC snowshoe series races. Carol took first in

the Senior (50+) women's competition, taking the win by 7 seconds! I also had the opportunity to get a unique perspective on the event from Bob Durband (Minnesota) who placed third in the Veterans (60+) category. I bumped into Bob on our flight to Minneapolis and found him quite engaging. He is relatively new to snowshoe racing, but his passion for the sport is obvious when he speaks. He had some interesting things to say about the course including "the downhill was too steep, that's not snowshoe racing that's luge!" He regaled me with tales of his trip to his first Nationals. He spent the night before the race sleeping in the back seat of his car in a Denny's parking lot. He woke up to the sound of coyotes howling and declared "What an incredible country".

The CMS group warmed down in Squaw Valley and before kicking back and relaxing took another easy run from Kings Beach to the 7,200' pass between Tahoe and Truckee. The 60degree temperatures and the views of the lake and the surrounding mountains made for a great backdrop. The variety of recovery techniques was interesting to say the least. Dan and Rich plunked down on the couch and barely moved the rest of the evening. Dan did get up at one point to polish off a pint of "Cherry Garcia" ice cream. Jim, Kevin, and Ben (the young guys) headed out to "check out some places". Kelli, Paul, and the Raitters (Bill and Sarah) sipped on some Natural light beer and ruminated on topics from the most disgusting websites, to the physics of shower curtains, to "no respect for runners in Bend". The weekend was an excellent opportunity to watch the best snowshoers in the country test themselves against the course and each other. In closing, this was a difficult experience for me being hampered by injury and unable to compete. The urge to strap on the shoes and jump into the fray doesn't easily diminish. However, I feel fortunate to have been able to train/compete/travel and document the weekend as I saw it. I think Bill Raitter summed up the experience succinctly when I asked him point blank if he knew what year this was. He sipped his beer, looked me square in the eye, and replied "Whuh?" Whuh indeed...

Next years Nationals are slated to take place on March 6th in Anchorage AK.

NIKE ACG U.S. NATIONAL SNOWSHOE CHAMPIONSHIPS 2004

Resort at Squaw Creek... Olympic Valley, CA... March 7, 2004...

It was right after The Moody Springs 5 mile race and the South Face Farm breakfast that Laurel Shortell and I lost our minds.... and flew West to compete in the national snowshoe championship race... Laurel was real cool about it... she had made her reservations weeks in advance, right after qualifying in her division at Northfield, MA regional snowshoe race. She was on a streak and didn't blink at doing Moody and then flying to Lake Tahoe that afternoon and competing at 8:30 am the next morning. Hey Laurel, I'm the Kaniac, remember??

Well, I was feeling like an aging Kaniac at the prospect of racing Moody, then the next day competing in a 10k snowshoe race that started at 6200 feet... not too bad, considering that most of my western skiing is well above that.... it's just that 6200 feet in a snowshoe race is about 6000 feet more than I am used to.

Well, I made reservations 2 weeks in advance and promptly chickened out. What was I thinking?? However, as time grew near, I felt as though I was giving up the chance of a lifetime, esp since the two races and travel would prob kill me and I'd never have a second chance. So I emailed Laurel again that I was (gulp) going. Yay, she emailed back and we were set. Her enthusiasm more than made up for my apprehension. But I was committed (or should have been) and was on a roll. I'd do Moody at a nice steady pace, saving my legs for nationals the next day. Ha! I RACED Moody as hard as I could, up the ice road, through the slush and streams, the only consolation was that I got to ice my achilles and calves on the run. That would def help for the 10k the next day.

Post-Moody was the South Face Farm breakfast, and in retrospect I don't know what the heck was in those blueberry pancakes, but I left fortified and invincible as I headed out the door and headed West. I was overcome by all the good luck and good wishes at breakfast. Laurel was on her itinerary and I was on mine... they would both lead us to the same place. I was quietly petrified.

Two flights later, a limo from Reno (will do slots in the airport on the way home) to the Resort at Squaw Creek, check into my room, open the curtains on the biggest, brightest full moon overlooking the highest, whitest mountains, towering over the most beautiful valley in the whole wide world. This is it! This is worth the whole trip! I was def on a high and knew then that I'd be able to compete... I was flying!

Checked on Laurel in the morning and she was good to go also. Checked out the start/finish area, met with Mark Elmore, registered, and got set to go. It was all like a dream.

This was the 4th annual championships. The best snowshoers from all over the country were there. There were 87 participants, with 27 of those from the Northeast. It was quite an elite field and yet the feeling was quite laid back and relaxed. Nikki Kimball warned me about the downhill.... "Be

careful, Carol, don't get injured on the downhill".... to which I replied..."No problem, I love downhills"... I should have known. I wished Ben Nephew and Nikki good luck and before you knew, it was ready set go.

"Go" meant tear up a mountain, a mile straight up, traverse a ridge and then a plummet down the downhill. They have a different tactic in the West... similar to a toboggan run, but no toboggan... you sit down on your butt, kick your shoes up in front of you, and slide down the trail... really fast... being careful to use your hands and forearms as balance and anchors, trying not to impale the person in front of you with your snowshoe cleats. Honest, that's how it was... that's how the downhill went... I mentioned that we never use this technique in the East and someone replied, this is how it's done in the West, and so, when in Rome.

The balance of the course popped you out into a beautiful valley meadow, wide groomed track, past the start/finish line and up into a short climb and pop back out into the meadow for another loop... all in all it was prob 70/30 groomed to ungroomed and I got to say, except for the altitude, the courses in the Northeast are def harder than this course. The last 800 yards was a total flat out, wide groomed track sprint to the finish.

Awards, medals and photos followed. Northeast's Nikki Kimball took the gold overall for the women and Greg Krause of Colorado took the men's title. For the teams, the Northeast Women were 2nd overall and the Northeast Men took 3rd. Eleven of the 27 Northeast athletes placed in the top five in their divisions.

I was totally high, saturated with the whole thrilling experience. Laurel and I had our best runs and now we weren't going to miss a single second of being there... so the first thing we did was EAT... then shower and shuttle busses to other areas and down to Tahoe City to get a look at Lake Tahoe and take pictures. We had dinner, said our goodbyes, see you at Moby, and called it a fantastic day.

I guess if I hadn't gone, I would never have known... I usually always go for it and I'm so glad I did this time. All the good luck and run well wishes bade me well at nationals. It was an experience I'll never forget. Traded in some miles and flew first class all the way home, but not before playing those slots in the Reno airport.

Laurel was a great sidekick and support on this trip and I am glad we had each other. Thanks Laurel....

SPRINGTIME IN NEW ENGLAND

03-20-04 - The first day of spring had perfect conditions for the Merrimack river snowshoe race. This would most likely be the last chance to snowshoe in Eastern Mass. The event had been originally slated to take place on January 4th. Unfortunately (or fortunately depending on your outlook) back in January the Eastern part of Massachusetts had no snow. The race was held as a cross country race and 20 runners took part with Jim Pawlicki taking top honors in 5:16 pace for the 3.3 mile mostly out and back run. I had hoped to have the race sometime during the winter, however we never had a decent snowfall until this week. Andover got about 8 inches of snow on Tuesday night. Dan (Verrington) and I checked out the course on Thursday and it was in very good shape for a snowshoe race. We were only the second set of prints to hit the trail, which had one set of Dion's and one set of ski tracks when we ran it. We were able to easily "jog" the course in 8:30 pace.

Some sun and upper 40 degree temperatures on Thursday and Friday left about 4 inches on the ground for the Saturday noon start. Dan ran the course in road running shoes and deemed it "runnable". Rich Bolt and I flagged the course and met up with Bill Morse (Dracut, MA) who was also out checking out the course. Bill noted that he had run the course on Wednesday and "it was great, I didn't want to stop". We completed marking the course in 33 minutes. Rich decide to run despite a sore ankle as it looked like Bill and I would be the only entrants. Norm Sheppard pulled up about 15 minutes before the start and that made for a field of four. Norm had also run the race in January finishing 13th in 6:49 pace. I had finished in 7th in 6:18 pace in what was my first test after taking a bad spill on some black ice and hurting my hamstring. The snowshoe version of the race would be my first hard effort since tearing my hamstring back on February 17th.

I had hoped for 6-10 runners to show up, but knowing that this is a busy weekend (New Bedford 1/2 Marathon, Winners circle 30K) and that word only went out on Thursday night, getting 4 of us to run was fine. Dan stuck around to do the timing and with his "ready, go" we were off. Rich yelled "wah hoo" and I yelled "Cayuga" and we took off.

Rich settled in right behind me and I tried to concentrate on working hard while listening to my hamstring. We hit the mile in 6:34. The sun was out, the wind was light and the course was beautiful. We hit the tough section at just after 1.5m when the course turns back. The big field (gas line) was very soft and the going was a bit slower. We completed that 1.3m in 8:50.

I tried to push it a bit during the last mile, knowing full-well that Rich could go by any time he wanted. The gentleman that he is, Rich allowed me to lead and I brought us to the finish with a 6:19 last mile. Rich was pleased as he had hoped to run somewhat hard and "really beat up the Atlas dual-tracs" that he was going to send back for repair. They definitely took a beating as about 200 meters of the course is run under the highway (Rt 93) on rocks.

I was pleased with my time which was only 56 seconds slower than what I raced in the XC version back in January. Norm and Bill both seemed to have a good time although neither accepted any of the Reebok shoes I was giving away as prizes, they did

however take a race t-shirt with January 4, 2004 scratched out



and March 20 written in. Bill did state that he will be back next week for the 13th running of the Merrimack river trail race (10m). Rich, Dan and I went out and removed all of the course markers (31 minutes) to get our short 10m for the day.

Now we just need a little warm weather and the course will be in fine shape for the "River" next week!

HAWLEY KILN / CENTRAL MASS STRIDER REPORT FROM DAVE DUNHAM

Another weekend another snowshoe race, this time is scenic Hawley MA. CMS again dominated the top 10 with six in the top 9 including the top 2 women. Conditions were excellent for snowshoe racing with temperatures just above freezing and a slight drizzle, which was replaced by a fairly thick fog.

The 7-mile course featured 1600' of climb and descent and had a 2m "out" section followed by a 3m loop and a return on the 2m section. The first .7m of the race was on wide groomed snowmobile trails and the next 1.3 was twisting single track. The 3m loop had a mix of single track and snowmobile trails and had most of the climb/drop.

Hawley Kiln holds some good memories for me, as it was my first snowshoe race. I decided to attend despite pulling my hamstring on Tuesday. Rich Bolt also chose not to run after experiencing some soreness in his hip after the Camp Saratoga race. I lead the CMS carpool, which had some difficulty making it to the race. We got stuck on the big hill leading to Hawley due to the couple of inches of fresh snow on the ground and the 30,000 miles on the cars tires. Unfortunately the 5 guys in the car did little to add weight and improve traction. We took 15 minutes to travel 1/2 mile while many four-wheel drivers went flying by. Fortunately the delay did not affect our arriving on time. Nikki Kimball was not quite so lucky arriving only moments before the start.

The field of 80+ runners lined up for instruction and I jogged out 1/4 mile to get a view of the race. As is typical, Ben Nephew took it out early. Paul Low tucked in behind, and by the first 1/4 mile there was already a gap to the chase pack of Elijah Barrett, Greg Hammett, Dan Verrington and WMAC points leader Jim Pawlicki. Nikki Kimball and Kelli Lusk were already poised to take a top ten finish. The next 45 minutes would be a nerve wracking wait for the first short course runners to return while discussing many topics with RD Ed Alibozek.

We had fun spotting runners coming out of the woods for the last 200m to the finish line. It was interesting picking out who was in the short race and who was in the long race. Paul Low had an excellent race, taking the lead just before the single track and never looking back. He had a grimace/smile when crossing the line and when asked what was up he replied "I thought I had a shot at the course record until I hit the single track on the way back". He continued, "It was really chewed up and slow going". Low finished just over a minute shy of the CR. Ben Nephew crossed the line soon after and once he caught his breath immediately stated "that single track was brutal!" He noted, "I flew on that section on the way out and could barely move on the way back". Elijah Barrett, who will be opening up a running store in Keene, crossed in third. Prior to the race he mentioned that "I trained pretty hard early and may have peaked too soon". Dan Verrington was top master finishing 4th overall. He finished just 20 seconds shy of the CR. Kelli Lusk smashed the women's CR by just under three minutes. Nikki Kimball took 2nd also breaking the CR by 45 seconds. During our warm down we took a moment to check out the Kiln for which the race is named. It was somewhat awe-inspiring. I highly recommend the trip to view this almost 200-year-old structure. Ed Alibozek mentioned that the Kiln has "mysterious healing powers". I can only hope!

The final chance for Easterners to tune up prior to the Nationals will be the WMAC Covered Bridges 8m next weekend. This has been an incredible winter for snowshoe racing in the East with only one race cancelled and one run as Cross-Country. Global warming? Bah!

Words from '04 HKK overall winner Paul Low -

Well, I finally won a snowshoe race in 2004; all that it took was for Rich Bolt to injure himself. In the absence of the Thunder Bolt, Ben Nephew took off from the gun and moved easily into the lead. I fell in behind and the two of us had a large lead on third place before hitting the singletrack at ~.7miles.

Just before the singletrack, I pulled ahead of Ben and then led with Ben closely following through the ~1.5 miles of one-lane single track that had seen only about 6 sets of showshoes in '04 (the RD and friends). I began to pull away from Ben after we hit the second groomed (snowmobile) trail and started to hit the rolling portion of the course.

With Ben and the rest of the field in arrears, I tried to work hard and run a technically sound race. This was difficult since the trails (the singletrack, at least) were rough enough that they required constant attention but the course is so beautiful that you are tempted to look around and take it all in.

I was feeling great and thinking about how I was going to smash the course record by several minutes when I reached the portion of the course that doubles back to the start. Usually, 80 snowshoers passing through an area makes a track much faster; with the conditions today, however, the field had chewed up the trail and coming back, it was like running in sand. After what seemed like an eternity, I hit the snowmobile track and hammered in toward the finish managing a 59:03. Despite threats of rain and sleet, the weather was a cloudy and very comfortable 33 - a beautiful day and a beautiful "tough but fair" course.

Having been mountain biking in Hawley a lot this winter, I went up to the Hawley Kiln Klassic snowshoe race with both snowshoes and my bicycle. I was hoping the snowmobile trails would be firm enough to ride on, and that the unpacked trails would not be so deep in snow that I could jog and push my bike. I figured the time I lost on the unbroken snow I could make up on the snow packed forest roads. At 9 AM I rode in a half mile or so and checked out the conditions, and deemed them firm enough to give the race a try on my bike. The first mile or so was fine, conditions as expected, but as soon as I tried to ride up a south facing hillside, I realized how much the snow had softened up in the morning sunshine. From there it got worse, as I had to traverse the north side of the hill in crusty unbroken snow, sometimes breaking through the crust up to my knee. I figured once I got back to the downhill section of snowmobile trail I could cruise again, but it too had softened up to much, and even riding on the level was almost impossible. At that point I just gave in to the fact that I should have left the bike at home and run on snowshoes. Of course the snowshoers were long past me by that point. Eventually I made it back to the forest road, only to find 2 more miles of snow too soft to ride on.
